Regarding federal policy work, the 2024 farm bill is an incredibly critical piece of legislation that has been our focus this vear in addition to other important issues that affect everyday operations. Read on to see what we've been involved with this past year on the next pages.

This past session in Pierre saw South Dakota Corn Growers Association help to ensure that property taxes on farmland were not inadvertently increased as an unintended consequence of other state tax policy changes. We also provided comments on issues throughout the year to federal agencies on a broad variety of topics such as crop protection, prevent plant and corporate average fuel economy standards.

A critical in-state marketing effort was driven by a tri-state survey to determine exactly how South Dakota consumers felt about ethanol. Surprisingly, we learned that dated perceptions about its safe use in modern engines and effect on gas mileage have changed little since its first emergence in the market decades ago. To address this, we launched an educational

campaign, Ethaknow, last January to dispel these myths. We're pleased to report that this campaign garnered incredible engagement for young drivers that we haven't seen in previous efforts.

Research is also a key component of the SD Corn overall mission. The continued development of new uses for corn starch remains a priority for the South Dakota Corn Utilization Council with efforts made by that board to be aware of funding opportunities in a way that maximizes the impact of that checkoff dollar.

As I look forward to 2024. I am appreciative of the opportunity to work for South Dakota corn farmers. Thank you for your continued support of SD Corn.

POLICY & LEGISLATION

Fully immersed in both state and federal policy that affects South Dakota corn farmers, South Dakota Corn Growers Association is committed to increasing the profitability of South Dakota corn producers through the membership's strong voice in legislation. While the vast majority of South Dakota farms continue to be family owned and operated, today, they have morphed into sophisticated operations that manage risk in various forms and size on a daily basis. This is the story that we bring to the table for legislators who may or may not have a good working knowledge of agricultural policy and how it directly affects producers of today.

In South Dakota, thanks to better genetics, fertilizer use, tillage practices, and increased rainfall throughout the decades, corn is raised in areas where growing corn was not previously sustainable.

With members on both the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives serving on the Agricultural Committees that have jurisdiction over federal agricultural policy, we are working diligently to promote South Dakota priorities in Washington, D.C., that make an impact now and for future generations.

FARM BILL INITIATIVES

MANDATORY BASE ACRE UPDATE

Last July, SDCGA delegates traveled to Washington, D.C., to represent South Dakota at the National Corn Growers Association (NCGA) Corn Congress. They presented a resolution supporting a mandatory base acre update which was adopted by a wide margin and has become an initiative for NCGA. Why does this matter? In South Dakota, thanks to better genetics, fertilizer use, tillage practices, and increased rainfall throughout the decades, corn is raised in areas where growing corn was not previously sustainable. This type of change updates acres that are eligible to be enrolled in ARC and PLC farm programs. Based on historical information, there may also be a savings associated with this policy that could be used towards other requests in the farm bill such as updating reference price. Current base acres are calculated using antiquated data from 1998-2001.

INCREASE IN REFERENCE PRICES

Joining forces with South Dakota Soybean Association, SDCGA urged federal policymakers to back increases in the statutory reference prices for corn and soybeans. Reference prices are critically low across the board for program crops compared to the break-even costs of production.

PROVIDING SUPPORT FOR IMPORTANT LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES

As one of the strongest grassroots agricultural commodity organizations in South Dakota, SDCGA has strongly supported the following legislative initiatives: protecting crop insurance, a call for issues in the fertilizer industry to be addressed in the upcoming farm bill and the expansion of nationwide, year-round sales of E15.

SDCGA CORNPAC

South Dakota Corn Grower's CORNPAC is a state political action committee that promotes the economic and social well-being of South Dakota corn producers and other agricultural-related interests. CORNPAC supports candidates for election to the South Dakota Legislature and state constitutional offices who are willing to commit support to the needs and values of South Dakota corn producers.

FERTILIZER PRICING QUESTIONED - A CALL FOR TRANSPARENCY

As the cost of fertilizer continues to be a primary concern for South Dakota farmers, it has also become a critical question for South Dakota Corn. Over a span of just 25 years from the 1980's to the mid-2000's, fertilizer production facilities have declined by 63% and the number of firms operating in this sector has decreased by 72%. To top it off, just four firms now control about 75% of nitrogen production in the U.S. and a single firm controls about 90% of phosphorus production. The USDA predicted that 42% of an average U.S. corn farmer's total operating costs in 2023 could be attributed to fertilizer.

The facts speak for themselves: while the American farmer is receiving less and less in return for their crops, the fertilizer industry has experienced record profits. Last June, the Rural Blog reported that Nutrien saw profits increase 1,575% between 2020 and 2022, the Mosaic Co. had a 438% increase, and CF Industries had a 955% increase.

The SDCGA proposed at July's NCGA Corn Congress changes to its policy book that resulted in the resolution, "Encourage initiation of action review, and/or policies for the Department of Justice, other appropriate agencies and/or in Congress to focus on agricultural mergers, acquisitions, vertical integration and price transparency, especially where competition and/or price discovery does not exist.". We are hopeful that as the 2024 farm bill progresses, this language will help spur regulatory and policy work in this sub-sector.

The SDCUC is also working diligently to help address this concern for the corn growers of South Dakota and to safeguard, when possible, our ability to farm profitably. "The cost of fertilizer has been on the mind of every farmer I meet. It has truly become a pivotal issue for us all on the South Dakota Corn Utilization Council Board," shared Chad Blindauer, SDCUC President, District 8.






