The unit of measurement farmers use. It is equal to 43,560 square feet—or about the size of a football field without the end zones.

An implement pulled by a tractor and used to make hay bales.

A grassy area farmers leave between fields. This helps prevent soil erosion.

A unit of mass or weight. A _ _ _ of corn weighs 56 pounds.

One of the largest machines on the farm. Farmers use them to harvest their crops.

After harvest, farmers deliver and sell their crop here. Grain is also stored here and loaded into trains or trucks.

This fuel is a renewable resource made from corn. We blend it with gasoline to power cars and trucks.

Farmers use them to store corn, soybeans or wheat after harvest. They come in many sizes and are usually made of steel.

Land used by farmers and ranchers for grazing livestock, especially cows.

A piece of farm machinery used to plant seeds in a field.

A row of trees or shrubs planted around the edges of farms or fields. They help protect crops from strong winds, prevent soil erosion and provide habitat for wildlife.

Some specialize in large animals like cows, pigs and horses. They travel from farm to farm helping sick animals, checking for diseases and working with farmers to make sure the animals stay healthy.
